

Wednesday p.m., May 24 — Beaumont-Hamel Newfoundland Memorial



The slaughter of the Newfoundland Regiment on the first day of the battle of the Somme on July 1, 1916, was one of the most heart-breaking events of the First World War. Of 780 men who moved forward, only 68 answered roll call the next day. The Caribou is a symbol of Newfoundland.

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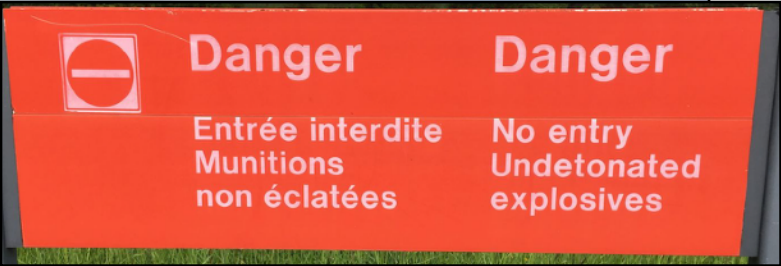
