

Many historians say Canada came of age as a nation at the battle of Vimy Ridge. The April 9, 1917, battle was the first time that all four Canadian divisions fought together. Their victory showed what Canadians could do. But it was at a terrible price — 3,600 dead and 7,000 wounded.
